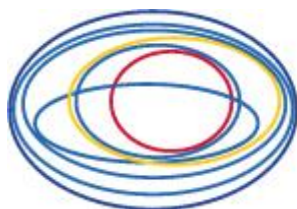

Kjære studenter, kjære gjester!

Dear students, dear guests!

Welcome to the European Integration Summer School 2022!

Established in 1990, we celebrated our 30th anniversary only a short while ago – at the beginning of the corona pandemic. Unfortunately, that was without you, our students and guest professors. So, we are really looking forward being back on campus again this year!

The summer school started in the late 1980s – partly as an ambitious exercise to foster the partnerships between the German city of Münster, the French city of Orléans and Kristiansand – it now certainly has evolved into one of the flagships of UiA. Furthermore, Europe-related research at our department and faculty has been recognized by the European Commission as a Jean Monnet Centre of Excellence in August 2020, after we had been awarded a Jean Monnet Chair from 2017 to 2020. In the years to come, we hope that our summer school will play an integral part of the university's commitment to a new European Universities Alliance, called FORTHEM (<https://www.forthem-alliance.eu/>).

As you know, we are going to study one of the most fascinating and dynamic phenomena of contemporary political life: the process of European integration. To many observers it seems that European integration has lost momentum, and that it has now even reached a critical juncture facing numerous internal and external challenges. What does this hold for the future political order of the European continent which seems to be characterized by ever-growing differentiation and complexity? Does the EU's architecture harness the Union just well enough to adjust to these challenges, i.e., is it going to be resilient enough? Are we perhaps at the brink of an 'ever more differentiated' if not an 'ever looser' European Union after all as suggested by Frank Schimmelfennig and Thomas Winzen in 2020? How has the European Union been dealing with the Covid-crisis, and the Russian war in Ukraine? These are just some of the questions that we are going to address at the European Integration Summer School in Kristiansand this year – after immersing ourselves in the more foundational aspects of European integration, such as the history, institutions and core policies of the EU – taking an interdisciplinary perspective. You will learn about historical and contemporary political processes of European integration that can explain some of the challenges both the EU and Europe are confronted with today.

At the beginning of May, you will have access to the reading material, e.g., via our online teaching tool Canvas. In order to prepare for the summer school, we would recommend that you have a look at any of the following books:

Ambassador **Nicolas de La Grandville** is the Head of the EU Delegation to Norway. He took up his duties in the EEAS on 1 September. De la Grandville has headed the Commission's protocol service since April 2010. He became director of protocol with effect from 1 February. Ambassador De la Grandville worked in the French foreign ministry and was spokesman for France's permanent representation to the European Union until 2007. Then he became diplomatic adviser to Nicolas Sarkozy, at the time the president of France. In 2008, De la Grandville was appointed deputy director and deputy head of protocol in the French ministry of foreign affairs.



R. Daniel Kelemen is Professor of Political Science and Law and Jean Monnet Chair in European Union Politics at Rutgers University, in New Jersey, USA. Kelemen's research interests include the politics of the European Union, law and politics, comparative political economy, and comparative public policy. His 2011 book *Eurolegalism: The Transformation of Law and Regulation in the European Union* (Harvard University Press) won the Best Book Award from the European Union Studies Association. He is author or editor of five other books including *The Oxford Handbook of Law and Politics* (Oxford University Press), and author of over one hundred articles and book chapters. Prior to Rutgers, Kelemen was Fellow in Politics, Lincoln College, University of Oxford. He has been a Member of the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton, visiting fellow in the Program in Law and Public Affairs (LAPA) at Princeton University, and a Fulbright Fellow at the Centre for European Policy Studies in Brussels.



Kiran Klaus Patel holds the chair of European history at Ludwig Maximilians University Munich. Before joining LMU, he held professorships at Maastricht University (2011-2019) and the European University Institute in Florence, Italy (2007-2011), and an assistant professorship at Humboldt University in Berlin (2002-2007). He has been (*inter alia*) a visiting fellow/professor at the Ecole des Hautes Etudes en Sciences Sociales in Paris, the Free University of Berlin, Freiburg University, Harvard University, the London School of Economics, Sciences Po in Paris and the University of Oxford. His latest publications include: *Project Europe. A History* (Cambridge University Press, 2020), *The New Deal: A Global History* (Princeton University Press, 2016).



Jarle Trondal is Professor of Public Administration and a member of the Jean Monnet Centre of Excellence at the University of Agder and Adjunct Professor at the Centre for European Studies, University of Oslo (ARENA). His research and teaching activities relate to the EU as a political system, administrative integration and transformation, the EU/EEA and Norway, the European Commission, international executive institutions, EU committee governance, agency governance. He recently co-edited *Differentiated Integration and Disintegration in a Post-Brexit Era* (Routledge, 2019) and the *Palgrave Handbook of Crises in the European Union* (Palgrave, 2021)



Nadja S. Kühn is a researcher at the Norwegian Research Centre (NORCE). She holds a Ph.D. in public administration from the University of Agder (UiA). Her research is primarily in the areas of Europeanization of domestic public administration and International public administration. In 2018, she won the best paper prize (together with Jarle Trondal) of the Norwegian Public Administration Journal (*Norsk Statsvitenskapelig Tidsskrift*). Her publications have, amongst others, appeared in the Journal of European Public Policy and the Journal of International Organizations Studies.



Stefan Gänzle is Professor of Political Science, a member of the Jean Monnet Centre of Excellence and Head of the Department of Political Science and Management, University of Agder. Previous affiliations include the German Development Institute in Bonn, the University of British Columbia in Vancouver and the University of Jena. He is the author of one book and has co-edited six books or special issues of academic journals. His most recent research has been published in the *Journal of Common Market Studies*, *Journal of European Integration*, *Political Studies Review*, *Public Administration*, and *Regional and Federal Studies*. He recently co-edited *Differentiated Integration and Disintegration in a Post-Brexit Era* (Routledge, 2019).



Claire Dunlop Professor of Politics and Public Policy at the University of Exeter, UK, and adjunct Professor at University of Agder. She researches science and politics, regulation, policy processes and EU public policy. For the past two decades, Claire has taught public policy process theories and policy analysis to undergraduates, and risk regulation and good governance to practitioner students and policy-makers in the UK, US and EU. She is editor *Policy & Politics* and is Vice Chair of the UK Political Studies Association (PSA).



Arne Niemann is Professor of International Politics and Jean Monnet Professor of European Integration Studies at the Department of Political Science of the Johannes Gutenberg University Mainz, Germany. His research focuses on the European integration process, European Union politics, and particularly the external relations of the EU. Arne's most recent work concentrates on European Culture and Science diplomacy (article under preparation with Petra Guasti), the role of the EU as a mediator in international peace negotiations (project and JCMS article with Julian Bergmann) and theorising the euro crisis (co-edited special issue of *Journal of European Public Policy*). His previous work has dealt with the role of the EU in (external) policy-making fields such as climate change and international migration, where I have particularly analysed aspects of effectiveness and normative power of the EU. He recently co-edited *Changing Perceptions of the EU at times of Brexit: Global Perspectives* (Routledge, 2020).



Hanna Shelest (PhD) is the Editor-in-chief of *UA: Ukraine Analytica*, Head of the Security Programmes at the Foreign Policy Council "Ukrainian Prism". She previously served as a Senior Researcher at the Odessa branch of the National Institute for Strategic Studies and a Visiting Research Fellow at the NATO Defence College (Italy). She has a PhD in International Relations, specializing in conflict resolution and security issues. Dr Shelest was an adviser of the Working Group preparing the Ukrainian Navy Strategy 2035 and was involved in working groups developing the Foreign Policy Strategy of Ukraine, Asian Strategy for MFA, and Ukraine's NATO Public Communication Strategy. She led different policy-related projects, among others: Scorecards of the Ukrainian Foreign Policy (2015-2021); Ukraine-NATO: Enhanced Level (2021-2022); The Hybrid War Decade: Lessons Learned to Move Forward Successfully (2019). Dr Shelest is a Rotary Peace Fellow (2010), John Smith Fellow (2012), Marshall Memorial Fellow (2016), and Visegrad Think Fellow (2019).



Alexander Ruser holds a position as Professor at the Department of Sociology and Social Work at the University of Agder. Before joining UiA he was a temporary Professor for Sociology and Social Structure Analysis and scientific head of the Center for Political Communication at Zeppelin University (Friedrichshafen, Germany). He holds a PhD in Sociology from the Max-Weber-Institute of Sociology at Heidelberg University and was a Dahrendorf Postdoctoral Fellow at the Hertie School of Governance in Berlin, the London School of Economics and Political Sciences and a visiting fellow at Punjab University, Chandigarh. His research focuses on political sociology, the role of „science in society” and the impact of scientific expertise on climate and economic politics. He is the author of *Climate Politics and the Impact of Think Tanks: Scientific Expertise in Germany and the US* (Palgrave Macmillan 2018).



Claudio M. Radaelli is Professor of Political Science at the University College of London. A comparative policy analyst, Claudio has published 80 articles and written or edited 17 books and special issues of academic journals. His main fields of specialization include the theory of policy learning, Europeanization, the role of economics in public policy, and regulation. He has also published in the field of research design, including a co-authored book on *Designing Research in the Social Sciences* and a co-edited volume on *Research Design in European Studies: Establishing Causality in Europeanization*.



Simona Piattoni is Professor of Political Science at the Department Sociology and Social Research, University of Trento (Italy), and a Professor-II at the University of Agder, Kristiansand (Norway). Previously, she has held positions at the University of Innsbruck (Austria) and the University of Tromsø (Norway). Simona Piattoni was Chair of the European Consortium for Political Research (ECPR) and of the Conference Group on Italian Politics and Society. Her research agenda focuses on multi-level governance, EU democracy and political clientelism. She is the author of *The Theory of Multi-level Governance. Conceptual, Empirical, and Normative Challenges* (Oxford University Press 2010.)



Frank Schimmelfennig is Professor of European Politics in the Center for Comparative and International Studies at ETH Zurich. He works on the theory of European integration and the political development of the European Union. His recent books are *Ever Looser Union? Differentiated European Integration* (OUP 2020, co-authored with Thomas Winzen) and *Integration and Differentiation in the European Union* (Palgrave 2022, co-authored with Dirk Leuffen and Berthold Rittberger)



Michele Chang is Director of the Transatlantic Affairs programme and Professor in European Political and Governance Studies at the College of Europe in Bruges. Her research interests concern euro area governance, particularly fiscal policy coordination and the European Central Bank. Recent publications include "The Art of Compromise: Belgium as the Bridge between Germany and France." *German Politics* (2021), "Sui generis no more? The ECB's second decade." *Journal of European Integration* (2020), and *The Political Economy of Adjustment Throughout and Beyond the Euro Crisis: What Have We Learned?* (Routledge, 2019, co-edited with Federico Steinberg and Francisco Torres). She is on the Board of the Trans European Policy Studies Association and previously served on the Executive Committee of the European Union Studies Association.



Tobias C. Hofelich is PhD Research Fellow at UiA's Department of Political Science and Management. He holds an M.A. in Euroculture from Georg-August-Universität Göttingen and Rijksuniversiteit Groningen (2016-2018). Prior to joining the University of Agder, Tobias worked as a public affairs consultant in digital and economic policy. His research is situated in the field of European integration studies. His current focus are processes of differentiation and disintegration in the European Union. In his most recent research project, Tobias studies the emergence and ramifications of informal differentiation in the EU, whereby the EU legal framework is deliberately circumvented.



Benjamin Leruth is Assistant Professor in European Politics and Society at the University of Groningen. He holds a PhD in Politics from the University of Edinburgh and previously worked at the University of Bath and the University of Kent. His research interests are Euroscepticism, differentiated integration in the European Union and public attitudes towards governance. He recently co-edited *Euroscepticism as a Transnational and pan-European Phenomenon* (Routledge, 2017), *After Austerity* (Oxford University Press, 2017), the *Routledge Handbook of Euroscepticism* (2018) and the *Differentiated Integration and Disintegration in a Post-Brexit Era* (Routledge, 2019).



László Bugyi is Ph.D. Research Fellow at the Department of Political Science and Management at the University of Agder. His research is primarily in the areas of Euroscepticism, EU legislative studies and European transnational party politics, with a particular focus on Hungary and Poland. László has an interest and experience in engaging students with informal education activities, such as debate workshops and simulation games, within the fields of democracy, populism and the European Union.
